Bi-fuel vehicle studied at MSU

A concept which could bring hybrid-electric power and increased fuel efficiency to older vehicles may go to the prototype phase this fall, those studying the concept said recently. said recently

This past semester, two recent Mississippi State University graduates performed a study to determine the feasibility of a business based on a retrofit of an existing used vehicle, said Gerald Nelson the director of the Jack Hatcher Entrepreneurship Program and the Thad Cochran Endowment for Entrepreneurship at MCIT

The mechanical engineering graduates — Forrest Exley and Nick Brimhall, from Jackson and Memphis, Tenn., respectively — used the project to complete their work in the Hatcher program. In the pro-



One long-time Starkville motel could begin getting a new lease on life as early as this summer if the city's Planning and Zoning Commission approves a conditional use to allow the property to be redeveloped into condominiums.

Tabor Properties LLC is seeking approval of a conditional use to allow the University Inn on QUESTIONS (general business)
district. If the commission gives its
OK, the proposed condominium project would then go before the Starkville Board of Aldermen for approval.

the owners of Tabor Properties plan to convert the 100-room University Inn, which recently closed, into 50 residential units to be offered for fee-

A condominium association would be established upon approval of a condominium plat, the "recording of which will be required prior to the sale of any real property," Griffith's report states. Initial plans for the property also call for the installation of a privacy fence, landscaping and parking area improvements. The motel's pool area, lobby building and surrounding property are not included in the conditional use request, and Tabor Properties owners are considering multiple redevelopment options for those areas with no definite plans, Griffith's report states.

A complete engineering assessment of the site is under way, with renovations scheduled to begin during the summer months, Griffith's report states. A condominium plat would be submitted shortly after the engineering assessment is com-

plete, the report states.


The footprint of the existing University Inn-buildings will not increase, nor will additional floors be added to those buildings, Griffith's report

The only major issue facing the site is a five-foot underground pipe that runs under the hotel building in what was once Catalpa Creek. An easement for long-term maintenance of the pipe will be necessary, and efforts have begun to draft an agreement, Griffith's report states.

Thus far, the Building, Codes and Planning Department has received no letters or calls objecting to the proposed project, though some calls have been received inquiring whether the project was a part of the Cotton Mill Marketplace project. The project is not tied to the Cotton Mill Marketplace,
